



The rail service for Canadian National Railway Co. (CN) and Canadian Pacific Kansas City (CPKC) is set to resume after a work stoppage that began last Thursday. This stoppage, initiated by a lockout due to an ongoing contract dispute between the companies and the Teamsters union, disrupted freight traffic across Canada and impacted commuter lines in Toronto, Montreal, and Vancouver. The work stoppage involved over 9,000 railway workers. On Saturday, August 24th, the Canada Industrial Relations Board (CIRB) issued a decision ordering both companies and their workers *to resume operations by 12:01 a.m. ET on Monday, August 26th*, with the dispute heading to binding arbitration. The Teamsters Canada Rail Conference, representing the workers, has expressed opposition to the CIRB's decision and intends to appeal the ruling. Meanwhile, CPKC has lifted all embargoes related to the work stoppage.

Key Points:

• Federal Intervention: The Canada Industrial Relations Board (CIRB) issued a decision on Saturday ordering both companies and their workers to resume operations by 12:01 a.m. ET on Monday.

- **Binding Arbitration:** The dispute will proceed to binding arbitration, as mandated by the CIRB.
- **Union Response:** The Teamsters Canada Rail Conference opposed the CIRB's decision and plans to appeal the ruling in court.
- **Resumption of Services:** CPKC lifted all embargoes related to the work stoppage immediately following the CIRB's decision
