



Starting Thursday, October 10, 2024, at 7 a.m., Montreal dockworkers, represented by the Longshoremen's Union (CUPE 375), will begin an indefinite overtime strike due to stalled contract negotiations with the Maritime Employers Association (MEA). While the port will remain operational during regular hours, the absence of overtime work is expected to cause delays in cargo processing and could lead to container congestion.

This labor action could disrupt the supply chain, particularly for businesses reliant on timely imports and exports. Companies using the Port of Montreal may experience delays and operational challenges, impacting trade flows and just-in-time delivery systems.

Key Points:

- Overtime strike begins: October 10, 2024, at 7 a.m., for an indefinite period.
