



Canadian ports have begun recovering from major labor disputes that halted operations across the country. The Port of Vancouver resumed activities on November 15th, 2024, while the Port of Montreal reopened earlier on November 13th, following the resolution of a worker lockout. Despite these reopening's, significant challenges remain, including vessel backlogs, high demand for anchorage, and terminal congestion. Recovery efforts are ongoing, with full operational capacity at both ports expected to take time.

Key Points:

- Vancouver: Reopened November 15th, facing anchorage and berth limitations.
- **Montreal:** Resumed November 13th, gradually ramping up operations.
- Delays Persist: Cargo movement and inland transport remain disrupted.
- **Customer Actions:** Businesses should plan for delays, explore alternative routes, and stay updated on developments
