GLOBAL APERTURE

<u>Delegates of the G7 nations met</u> this week to discuss pressing regional issues from the Russia-Ukraine War to reshoring cooperation with China. The upcoming <u>ASEAN and East Asia Summits</u> will likely shed more light on inter-bloc trade and economic policy as EU and US leaders join in the conferences.

<u>Trade analysts report slashes across the board</u> for ocean freight capacity due to outright service suspensions. <u>In a recent interview</u>, Maersk CEO projected "plenty of dark clouds on the horizon," alluding to future economic sentiment and consumer demand.

There's (year-over-year) deflation in the air cargo market, <u>says some industry data firms</u>. Others say there may not be a <u>peak season this winter</u>. But softening volumes are more significant than they appear—outbound volumes ex-APAC to Europe and Americas pushed stronger in the second-half of October, <u>notes data firm WorldACD</u>.



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REGIONAL FOCUS - AMERICAS

Congestion on the East Coast and in Houston continue; the latter's port authority will issue a container dwell fee this December if matters persist. <u>The Mississippi stoppages spread from St. Louis</u> to as far north as Ohio. Transpacific trade lanes get more than the usual trimmed sailings with <u>over 1 million TEUs of boxship capacity benched</u>, and three terminals at the Port of Oakland were held up on November 2 due to a <u>standalone ILWU work stoppage</u>.

<u>The skies are open, but the region's air cargo sector</u> is bracing for a demand slump after new US data revealed a trade deficit of <u>\$73.3 billion for the month of September</u>—widened by increases in consumer electronic imports, while the dollar's strong exchange value petered exports.

In Brazil, the Bahia municipality approves <u>a decision to construct three factories</u> for a Chinese auto brand—intended to manufacture vehicle chassis in addition to processing lithium and iron phosphate.

REGIONAL FOCUS – ASIA-PACIFIC

Due to strong headwinds and payload issues, <u>Cathay Pacific may once again route</u> long-haul flights through Russian airspace. The decision will cut return flight times by almost three hours. <u>Gloomy outlook</u> <u>grounds</u> the planned launch of a Vietnamese cargo airline.
